
To research information about pearls, I checked at the library in addition to an on-line search. Plus, I expect that members have some familiarity with pearls. While they may not be a favorite,

A program about Iris Agate is the only winner in the 2010 Competition.

Based on the photographic work and notes of Peter (Pete) Rodewald (St. Croix Rockhounds, MWF), Wayne Sukow (Northern Virginia Mineral Club, EFLMS), produced this culmination of Pete's work to find and capture stunning iris images -- what he called "Extreme Iris"-- not only from ordinary sources but unexpected ones as well.

Pete's work has been recognized internationally (including Walter Zenz' book about agates) and he presented a similar program at the Agate Symposium at Menasha, Wisconsin in 2008. But he did not finalize the presentation before his untimely death in 2009. Fortunately, Wayne had been an advisor and close collaborator, which allowed him to fulfill his promise to Pete to complete the project. (Note: this program is not included in the Wide World of Agates DVDs.)



Warm welcome to all new members and we hope you will volunteer for one or more of the many duties that make participation in WSLC more fun! You will be assigned to your team soon and we still need a secretary or two!

The pearl, of course, is not mined like most other gemstones. It may take 8 years to create a pearl. The lustrous substance is called nacre and covers the bit of sand that finds its way (or is inserted) into the mollusk. The nacre layers build up slowly to protect the soft interior surface of the mollusk; and thus a pearl is created.

This month we will expand the topic of pearls and review three current books that are available for purchase, or free, via interlibrary loan. The books provide a wealth of information and two feature fantastic photos to better illustrate the written content. One is a historical narrative about pearls

over time and the current industry. Another is a great resource as a buying guide for pearls. Yet another book clearly depicts how pearls can be incorporated in custom fashioned jewelry. Enjoy the resources in detail, at your leisure.



Newman, Renee. Pearl Buying Guide; How to identify and

evaluate pearls and pearl jewelry. 5<sup>th</sup> edition with new pearls and jewelry styles. 2010. This comprehensive book has just been updated and is a handy 9x6 size. There are numerous photos, some with magnification, to show examples. The charts and diagrams are especially helpful regarding colors, shapes, and sizes. Completed jewelry pieces are shown to exhibit the versatile uses of pearls. The details include how to tell a fake pearl from a real one, and how to detect treatments that were used. It also guides the reader on how to select pearls of good quality, and also shows examples of antique or collectible jewelry. Terminology is included with thoughtful descriptions. This easy to understand guide includes a wealth of information.

Alden, Nancy. Simply pearls: Designs for creating perfect pearl jewelry. 2006. This carefully diagrammed and illustrated book provides guidelines for purchasing pearls and how to use and wear the pearls most effectively. The numerous projects can be relatively easy to construct and yet stunning. Other projects are in the intermediate and advanced skill level. There is helpful information on the basics including stringing, and knotting. Reinventing older pearls to more currently stylish designs is included, along with proper care of pearls throughout the years. Helpful information and diagrams clearly specify design techniques and equipment. While the book is good size, it allows the format to be in two columns, and spacious on the page. There are numerous close-up photos to illustrate the completed projects whether necklaces, bracelets, earrings, or pendants. There are numerous examples for the pearl enthusiast. The 143 pages of the 8 1/2 x 11 glossy soft cover book.

Another current book, and unlike the others, is Stephen G. Bloom's 2009 nonfiction book: *Tears of Mermaids*:

The secret story of pearls. He has a three year research adventure to follow the search for pearls, and witness a pearl through the processes to market and purchase. He clearly documents various areas and historical events related to pearls. At one time, pearls were more expensive than gold or silver. The availability of natural pearls has declined, though the cultured pearls allow a greater supply. The author gained access to China, the Philippines, French Polynesia, and Australia. He interviews main movers in the industry and presents tales of intrigue. The depiction of pearls in famous paintings and fashion are also presented.

This book is a detailed account of the culture of pearls over time. Economic, environmental, social issues are included. Bloom even shows a sense of humor in the quest for material for this publication. This is definitely a worthwhile book to include facts and the human story.

To show the modern day allure of pearls, there is a chapter in Dan Ariely's 2009 book: *Predictably Irrational; the hidden forces that shape our decisions*. He is a behavioral economist who presents experiments about decision making. The pertinent chapter is entitled: The fallacy of supply and demand; Why the price of pearls—and everything else—is up in the air. The example is of finding black pearls which had an unknown value. While increasing the supply, and careful high end marketing, the black pearl now is a valuable and sought after gem in the marketplace.

Lastly, as one becomes more aware of pearls and status at this time, it is noted that in recent events, pearls appear in numerous ads and photos. One photo frequent-
